## Message from the President

They are now contemplating selling the buildings off piece by piece with the possibility of some if not all of them being torn down. Although I am horrified that any part of our beloved campus could be torn down, it could possibly open up the option for us to raise the funds to purchase one of the buildings as a place to put a museum and have a gathering place for us. We have also been approached by Wentworth with an offer to possibly put a Kemper museum and Alumni Hall on their campus. When you put the two possibilities side by side, attempting to purchase a building on the campus seems like the obvious choice but when you factor in the amount of money required to purchase, refurbish and open up a museum, plus the fact of trying to figure out what would happen to the property after we are all gone, it doesn't seem like such an easy question. Call me or any of the other board members and let us know what you think and what you would be willing to support. Second, we need donations. The alumni association is a non profit organization that exists entirely on donations. We have not held a major fundraising campaign since the school shut down because we knew that at some point we would have to have a major campaign to fund a museum and we wanted to conserve our resources until then. The time for that is coming soon and our bank accounts are dangerously low. In order to raise funds, we will need funding for mail-outs, etc. We also need funds to continue to purchase items from the school as they come up for sale on places like eBay. ## **Kemper Alumni Runs for Prime Minister of Thailand**

### **Suwit sees his chance**

#### **The leader of the Puea Pandin party says difficult times prepared him for politics - and a decade in parliament has honed him for the premiership**

THE BUZZ OF optimistic he'll play a major role in the next government – if not the supreme role. He explains why in a chronicle of his decade in politics, just unveiled at a Central World Plaza bookstore. Suwit Khunkitti is quite confident he's going to be Thailand's next prime minister, even if he's currently flying under most people's radar. The leader of the Puea Pandin - For the Motherland - party is genuinely brimming with confidence. The day before he and his colleagues registered as party-list candidates, Suwit launched an autobiography called "Pen Pai Dai Ta Jai Soo", which translates as "For his country, one man will achieve the impossible". It covers his experiences in politics over the past 10 years. "I usually believe that no news is good news, so I stay out of the news - that's why nobody knows what I'm up to now!" he laughs. He's making sure everyone knows now what he's up to, though, with the book, in which modesty plays no part. It's chock-full of self-praise. Suwit casts himself as meditative, self-disciplined and fluent in English, as well as a clever mimic of Mexican, Portuguese and even an American southern drawl. At one point he says he's sorry he left the US because he could have competed against Arnold Schwarzenegger for the governorship of California. *Suwit claims to have done his share of scrubbing floors, stretching the reader's belief since he was born to a well-to-do family in the petrol business. As a teenager he planned to move into the family business by running a gas station in Khon Kaen. But instead he joined his brother at Kemper Military School and went through a lot of physical torment - "100 push-ups and running all the time".* He did a series of lowly jobs so he could study chemistry at the University of Kentucky and buy a cheap Chevrolet. "If my staff, my driver or the people who work in the gas station knew that I used to clean toilets and pick up cigarette butts they'd probably laugh, but I probably did more than they've ever done," he says. Suwit's ambition had been to become a doctor, and he took premed at the military academy, but he decided that the competition was too tough and opted for chemistry instead. All the hard work and scrambling has prepared him mentally and physically for politics, he says. There was a time when he disdained politicians, thinking they were all covered in muck, but when he returned from the US and saw his homeland again, he decided he'd try and make things better. He was elected to parliament in 1983, representing Khon Kaen. "At that time there was no money involved in that kind of politics," he says. "The people just love you - they know who you are and how close you are to them." In a television interview last week Suwit was asked what he would do if a member of his party were caught buying votes. He wouldn't even know about he, he replied, since the members are scattered across all the regions. It was a non-committal answer to a moral question. Suwit maintains that he has the qualifications needed to serve as prime minister - vision, courage and decisiveness. Being effective in a crisis situation is crucial, he says, and in his book he mentions helping out the tsunami victims. "I probably have more experience in politics than any other party leader at the moment," he says. "I've been deputy prime minister five times, I've been the head of seven ministries, in parliament I was twice chairman of standing committees, I'm involved with economic and social-development programs, science technology, social issues, agriculture and

even justice."Before any problems can be solved, Suwit says, Thailand needs political stability. Inter-party disputes have to be resolved. Then the economy needs fixing.

#### **Denver D. Jones, Jr.**

*November 26, 1929 – August 30, 2007*

Denver D. Jones, Jr., 77, of Wilburton, Okla., passed away Thursday, August 30, 2007 in Fort Smith. He was born Nov. 26, 1929, in Hartshorne, Okla. Mr. Jones was a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Wilburton and a veteran of the U.S. Navy, serving six months at Great Lakes Naval Station and one and a half years at Bremerton, Wash., at the U.S. Naval Hospital. He married the former Mary Lou Burke on June 14, 1954, in Wilburton. Denver was a graduate of Kemper Military School (1944-1947), serving as Chairman of the Board; and attended the University of Oklahoma and the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science, graduating in 1951. Mr. Jones served two years as a board member for the Oklahoma Funeral Directors Association; 17 years with the State Board of Embalmers & Funeral Directors, serving as the president for three terms; a member of the International Conference of Funeral Service Examining Boards in Fayetteville, serving one year as President; and chairman of Selected Funeral & Life in Hot Springs. He was a founding member of First Community Banking Corporation in 1984, serving as director for First National Bank of Hot Springs, Mount Ida and Mena. Denver owned funeral homes in Wilburton, McAlester, Talihina, Poteau and Pocola, OK. He was preceded in death by his parents, Denver D. Jones Sr. and Cecelia Katigan Jones; and his first wife, Mary Lou Jones. He is survived by his wife, Sharon Jane Jones of the home; daughter Mary Kay Jones of Tulsa; granddaughter and her husband, Courtnie Denise (Griffis) and John Tidwell of Tulsa; sister Janacele Whitlock of Kokomo, Ind. Special son, Jimmy D. Cook of Poteau; and caregivers, Freda Smelley, Kim McPhail, Paula Thomas, Diane Walton, DeMond Ward, Dewayne Whitmore, Eric Nelson and Love Chaffin and his administrative assistant, Sharon Parsons.

#### **W. Kirby Lockard**

*July 24, 1929 – June 25, 2007*

W. Kirby Lockard, FAIA age 77, died 25 June 2007. Kirby was born in Cobden, Illinois on 24 July 1929 and grew up in Southern Illinois. He graduated from Kemper Military Inst. and served in the U.S. army for two years. He received a Bachelor of Science in Architecture in 1952 from the University of Illinois, moved to Tucson, Arizona where he worked for the architectural firm of Scholler and Sakellar, then went on to complete his Master in Architecture from MIT in 1962. He returned to Tucson and began teaching in the College of Architecture at The University of Arizona. Kirby actively practiced architecture and authored numerous books on architecture and design communications while a Professor of Architecture at the University of Arizona's College of Architecture and Landscape Architecture and retired as Professor Emeritus in 1999. A nationally recognized architect, professor, author, artist and city planner, he was a kind, loving,

understanding communicator and truly a Renaissance Man. His books include Drawing as a Means to Architecture, Design Drawing, Design Drawing Experiences, Architectural Delineation, Freehand Perspective for Designers, and Drawing Techniques for Designers. He pioneered video teaching with twenty videotapes on architecture drawing, known as the Design Drawing Videotapes. His teaching and his publications are known throughout the world and his students, numbering in the thousands, consider him one of their greatest professors. He was an invited lecturer at over 25 universities in the U.S., Canada, Great Britain and Mexico and conducted many national and international workshops for students, teachers, and professionals. He and his wife, Peggy, loved to travel visiting most of the U.S., Great Britain, Europe, Egypt, the Greek Islands, Canada, Mexico, Australia and New Zealand. Kirby's architectural accomplishments are highly recognized and include banks, residences, and churches and his work had been highly published. In 1969, he received the Regional Award of Merit from the American Institute of Architects for Dove of Peace Lutheran Church in Tucson, Arizona. In 1976, he was awarded the University of Arizona's Creative Teaching Award and "Acknowledged as one of the top teachers of architectural graphics in the United States," and "...the prime influence on generations of young architects in the country." In 1976, he won third prize at a national urban housing competition in Miami, Florida. He was invested as a Fellow in the American Institute of Architects in 1977 and in 1989, he received the Western Mountain Region AIA's highest award—the Silver Medal. He was awarded the inaugural Educator Award from the AIA in 1995. He and Peggy are members of the Presidents Club at the University of Arizona and have donated numerous scholarships to the College of Architecture and Landscape Architecture. He was a founder of the national Design Communication Association whose members teach in colleges and universities throughout the U.S. and Canada. He will be missed every moment of every day by his beloved wife, lover and partner of 34 years, Peggy Hamilton Lockard; his three children, Rita Gail Champlin (Joseph), Melvin Scott Lockard (Nancy Marmion) and William Brodie Lockard; his two step-children, Sandra Gieske Larriva (Phillip) and David Brian Gieske (Cyndi); and his four grandchildren, four step-grandchildren and one step-great-grandchild. Kirby was preceded in death by his parents, Zella Mangold Lockard and Melvin C. Lockard. A private family service has been held. A celebration of Kirby's life will be held at the College of Architecture later this summer. ## **Hank Wegner**

I just learned of the death of Hank Wegner, age 80 of Pierre SD. Hank attended Kemper from 1943 – 1945. Following graduation from Kemper, Hank joined the navy and served on the USS Antitium, until he was honorably discharged in August of 1946. Hank was a successful auto dealer; his company Wegner Auto just celebrated its 100th Anniversary. I serve on a Foundation Board with his sister Helen who tells me he had many fond memories of Kemper and was saddened to learn of her closing.

## **Roy S. Randerson, Jr.**

*January 23, 1920 – November 6, 2007*

Roy S. Randerson, Jr., and international oil executive, who as a teenager on a shoestring tour of Europe reported seeing at close range the Nazi hierarchy of Adolf Hitler, Hermann Goering and Joseph Goebbels, died Nov. 6, 2007 in a Houston Hospice after suffering a fall. He was 87. In 1937, the 17 year old Randerson sailed on a freighter for a 75-day visit to Europe. In Munich, Randerson, who enjoyed classical music, attended a performance of Richard Wagner's opera *Der Fliegende Holländer* (*The Flying Dutchman*). Sitting in a front-row seat in the balcony, Randerson recalled in a short memoir he wrote last year, he saw a large delegation of Nazi leaders taking their seats for the performance. Randerson often remarked that had he known the trouble the trio would inflict, he might have been able to change the course of history, said his daughter, Marjorie "Middy" Randerson of Houston. Roy Sylvester Randerson was born Jan. 23, 1920, in Oklahoma City, son of oil wildcatter Roy S. Randerson and Lula Bartlett Stevens Randerson. He graduated from Classen High School in Oklahoma City and earned an Associate's degree in Science from Kemper Military School in Missouri. In 1933, a 13 year old Randerson traveled to Chicago on a YMCA trip to the World's Fair. There he met his future best friend and brother in law, Earl L. Yeakel, Jr., who became an anesthesiologist in Austin. At the fair the boys crawled under a flap in a tent to see the famous stripper and fan dancer, Sally Rand, Middy Randerson said. In 1941, Randerson graduated with honors from the University of Oklahoma. He then came to Houston, where he joined Pure Oil Co. The day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Randerson applied for a commission in the Navy, his daughter said. Randerson served in combat on the USS Bataan (CVL-29), a small aircraft carrier, where he shared living quarters with three pilots. One night, all three pilots failed to return from their missions, he said. After the war, Randerson returned to Houston and joined Tenneco Oil Co. In 1965, he became president of Tenneco Oil Co. of Nigeria and he and his family moved to Lagos. In 1969 the Randerson's moved to London, here Roy Randerson began a career as an independent oil consultant. After 10 years in England, the family returned to Houston. "He was a wildcatter's son and was a wildcatter his whole life," Middy Randerson said. "His father made and lost three fortunes, and his son made and lost one." His wife of 65 years, Marjorie Daw Yeakel Randerson, died in 2005. Survivors include Randerson's stepmother, Agnese Randerson of Houston, three grandchildren, Christopher Lonsford of Houston, Amanda M. Simpson of Coppell, and Billy R. McKeen of Denver. No services are planned.

### Charley G. Rader

3/23/1932 – 7/19/2007

Charley G. Rader, longtime Longview resident and the owner of Rader Funeral Home, passed away peacefully July 19, 2007, surrounded by his family. He was born March 23, 1932, in Paris, Texas, the son of LeRoy and Minnie Bea Rader. He grew up in Kilgore and attended Kilgore public schools and Kemper Military School in Missouri. He graduated from the University of North Texas and then the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science. He married his sweetheart, Betty Wyche, in December of 1952. They moved to Longview in the fall of 1953, after his father had purchased the Rains and Talley Funeral Home on Fredonia Street in downtown Longview. When they moved to Longview, they knew no one, but made many wonderful friends and always thanked the Lord that he brought them to Longview. Raised as Presbyterians, one of the first things Betty and Charley did was join the First Presbyterian Church in Longview, where he served as a teacher, deacon, elder and trustee. As a young man, he was active in many organizations, including the Jaycee's. He was invited to join the Longview Rotary Club, where he had 50 years perfect attendance and had served as president, and he was honored by being selected a Paul Harris Fellow. He served as a director of the International Order of the Golden Rule, an international group of independent funeral home owners. He also served as president of

the East Texas Funeral Directors Association and served a term as a director for the Texas Funeral Directors Association. Through the years, he served in many other organizations, including the American Heart Association and the Red Cross. He served as a community advisor for the Junior League of Longview and worked on the committee that organized the Greater Longview United Way and was currently a founding trustee of the Greenwood Cemetery Association. He was chairman of the board of LeRoy Rader Funeral Home, Inc., vice-president of East Texas Crematory, Inc. and secretary of Rosewood Park Cemetery. Charley was a man of great faith, extraordinary courage and strength. He was a loving and devoted husband, father, and grandfather and a friend to many. His faith in Christ sustained him through many years of heart disease. He never let his illness get him down and always bounced back with grace to fulfill the task the Lord put before him. A man of great integrity and compassion, he was born to be a funeral director. Survivors include his wife of 54 years, Betty; his daughter, Lynn Martin and her husband, Jerry of Longview, and their children, Emily Martin of Houston and Laura Martin of Dallas; and his son, Charles Rader and his wife, Lacy of Longview, and their children, Preston Rader and Sarah Rader, both of Lubbock. He leaves a sister, India Rader Stroope of Kilgore; a niece; and several nephews.
